

This roundtable discussion focuses on the recently published *Routledge Handbook of Byzantine Visual Culture in the Danube Regions, 1300–1600* (2024), which aims to broaden knowledge about the history, art, and heritage of Eastern Europe relative to Byzantium. The interdisciplinary framework of this handbook, covering history, literature, art history, architecture, philology, material culture, and theology, offers an in depth examination of the visual culture of regions of modern Greece, Croatia, Serbia, Romania, Hungary, Slovakia, Czechia, among others, in between local traditions, the Byzantine heritage, and cultural forms adopted from other models in the medieval and early modern periods.

By gathering four of the authors that contributed to various sections of the volume, we aim to spark a discussion about the interconnectedness of this broad geographical area too often either studied in parts or neglected altogether, emphasizing its shared history and heritage. In addition, we aim to offer a fresh and original approach to the history, literature, and art history of the Danube regions.





The roundtable participants reflect the international nature of the volume, including diverse speakers from Romania, Italy, and USA at different scholarly levels, ranging from senior researchers and tenure-track professors to graduate students. The discussion will cover the rich material culture of the Danube, from Wallachian and Moldavian monumental art, to painting and metalwork, and the reach of the Danubian lands to Greece and Egypt.

The speakers include: **Elisabeta Negrau** (George Oprescu Institute of Art History); **Alice I. Sullivan** (Tufts University), **Andrei Dumitrescu** (Stanford University), and **Anita Paolicchi** (University of Pisa).

Collaborative Efforts

The *Mentorship Program for Scholars at Risk* is now running in its second iteration!

A collaboration between North of Byzantium, <u>Dumbarton Oaks</u>, and <u>Connected Central European Worlds</u>, <u>1500-1700</u>, this mentorship program for 2024-2025 is tailored to East-Central European scholars, with a special focus on those affected by the ongoing conflict in Ukraine. 



We thank all the participants and speakers for their time, dedication, and support of this initiative!




NoB-related Publications and Events

Alice's book - *The Eclectic Visual Culture of Medieval Moldavia* (Boston and Leiden: Brill, 2023) is the recipient of the **2023 Early Slavic Studies Book Prize** from the *Early Slavic Studies Association* (ESSA) for the best book published between September 1, 2021 and August 31, 2023 in the field of Early Slavic Studies (pre-1800).



Another recent book is <u>Europe's Eastern Christian</u> <u>Frontier</u> (York: ARC Humanities Press, 2024). This book argues for Moldavia's central role in the political, military, economic, and cultural spheres of Eastern Europe from the second half of the fourteenth century to the turn of the sixteenth century.

Inaugural ESSA Conference

The *Early Slavic Studies Association* (ESSA) will host its <u>first conference</u> at The Ohio State University, 7-8 March 2025. The conference is supported by the Hilandar Research Library (HRL) and the Resource Center for Medieval Slavic Studies (RCMSS).

The 2025 theme is "Archive".

The conference aims at introducing and analyzing previously unknown archival sources (manuscripts and early printed books) that contribute to our understanding of the field of Early Slavic studies.

<u>Eastern European Visual Culture and Byzantium (13th -17th c.)</u> is an NoB book series that explores the art, architecture, and visual culture of regions of the Balkan Peninsula, the Carpathian Mountains, as well as early-modern Russia and Ruthenia between the thirteenth and seventeenth centuries. We invite proposals for monographs, edited volumes, and conference proceedings. We are also interested in translations in English of medieval textual sources and/or of recent publications focusing on the medieval and early modern art, architecture, and visual culture of regions of Eastern Europe.
